Churches have been white-washed, religious flags are sailing and tender lambs slaughtered in time for roasting on Easter Sunday. Greece has buried its scandalful winter and if you ask anyone, all is good!

And good it is indeed. Kythera underwent a transformation this winter. You could do yoga 4 times a week with the highly motivating and learned Nataly Wierthaim. The new-blood of the decade-old Film Society re-introduced a thriving, controversial cinematic programme to the island, with weekly screenings in Chora and Potamos while the local Council of Kythera begrudgingly began weekly art and drama classes. On Easter Monday cafés were packed with the sunglassed-weary overfed who sipped on their frappes The marathon food-gorge had drawn to a close and the Vincenzo Kornaro left the dock of Diakofti packed with Easter revellers and the spiritual faithful.

## The Red Eggs of Easter

Easter was and is such an important part of my life. As a child, I would watch as my mother prepared for this Holy day, boiling red eggs, and baking the Easter breads with the red eggs baked into them. On the Sunday, as we prepared to attend Church at Agia Triatha in the afternoon, there was such a flurry of excitement. My parents had always bought me such a pretty new dress, Mary Jane white patent leather shoes with my ankle socks. Getting dressed in all my finery to attend Church services was such an exciting time.

My father would join the other Kytherians singing in the choir. The hymns which were so meaningful to our Christian Easter. There were few pews in the Church, and the service long. As a child, I would get so tired standing for such a long period of time. The Archbishop would address the Kytherian congregation attending the services. We had always, as we entered the Church, placed money in the tray, and would

take candles to light, and say a silent prayer, and then we would pay our respects to the Holy Icon which was located near the tray of candles, with the sand to collect the wax as the candles burned.

After the services, over a hundred guests would congregate at our home. My parents were renowned for their hospitality. The garden would fill with many loved and respected friends and relatives, and I would take a basket given to me by my mother, full of the eggs which she had spent hours dyeing red. We would then do "skoundri". Many times I would be the one left with my egg unbroken. There were more eggs than I could possibly remember. The atmosphere was one of joy as Kytherian people congregated in our home and garden, many seeing friends and family members who they had not seen for months or even years. So many friends and relatives came from country towns to share this special day.

When I returned to Kythera some years ago accompanied by my son David, the true meaning of Easter was once again celebrated in the true spirit of this special Holy day. Seeing a truck arrive at the guest house where we were staying full of different cheeses was such a sight. Preparations well under way for the Easter celebrations. The children from the neighbouring homes came to ask if we would be attending midnight Church services. We declined but, the next day, we also dressed in our finery, which was rare, as our life on the island was one of casual clothing. I lit a candle for my loved ones, living and deceased, saying a silent prayer, knowing I would be heard, and after the services, everyone had such a feeling of festivity: laughing, mingling, seeing so many friends and family, having taken time from the days when they worked so hard, to share this Holy day, dispersing eventually, to go to their individual homes to share the wonderful meal which awaited them.

We gathered at our family home for Easter lunch. Such a wonderful meal, prepared by my cousin Koula, coming together with other family members, and, as was custom, we finished our meal with the red eggs, and "skountri". I again was the final one to have an unbroken side of an egg.

The following day, we were invited to my best friend Marika's home for lunch. Marika had never married, worked long hours, and lived the simple life which made her so happy. Marika brought many different dishes to the table, and with my cousins and my son David, we marvelled at the sumptuous meal she had prepared. David made me so proud that day, enjoying every dish she put on the table. How many sacrifices she must have made to place such a sumptuous feast before us.

# CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

EXPRESSION OF INTEREST SOUGHT



Anyone wishing to sample the sport of clay target shooting now has the opportunity to do so. Due to the authorities finally relaxing the appropriate laws, any unlicensed person can go to a registered gun club and give it a try as long as they sign a declaration and are accompanied by a licensed shooter.

A group of regular licensed shooters, many being young Kytherians, who have shown an interest in organising an event where we can exclusively hire the entire Gun Club, can hold a "Fathers & Sons" style competition. This would involve a quick lesson, 2 rounds of 25 targets each and a BBQ. Some of our local gun shops, which are owned and operated by Greeks, have given their support to the event by way of some prizes to be won on the day. Proposed day will be a Sunday from say 10am to around 3pm. Cost will be approximately \$75 per participant which includes BBQ, clay targets & shells for the 2 rounds and the practice session.

The Gun Club will be the Sydney Branch of NSW Field & Game which is located at Heathcote Road Menai (2 km north of the intersection of Illawarra & Heathcote Roads). This club undertakes what is known as "simulated field" or "sporting clays" where the targets are set up in bushland and mimic wild game such as rabbits, ducks, driven birds etc. It is a lot of fun set in bushland surroundings. I am sure there are many Dads or Granddads out there who would love to shoulder their favourite shotgun again and have their sons, daughters or grandkids by their side.

We wish them both all the best as they embark in their chosen career.







# Departing for abroad: Reminiscences of Kytherian migration by a naval agent



The well-known Kytherian academic and researcher, Calypso Michalakaki, chose an interesting subject for the paper which she delivered at the Third International Kytheraismos Symposium. Her father. And the topic: The personal experiences of a naval agent on Kythera, Christos Michalakakis (pictured above with his daughter), regarding Kytherian migration and the relatives left behind.

Christos Michalakakis worked for many years arranging for Kytherians to leave the island and migrate by ship to distant shores in search of fortune and a better life. Now retired, and content with a more sedentary life on the island, Christos' reminiscences have been relayed by his daughter in a most insightful way.

Personal memory, based on the work of Paul Connerton in *How Societies Remember*, refers to individual and particular memory claims that take as their objects one's life history. Personal memories and experiences are a vital component of our collective cultural memory. It is the personal memories and experiences of Christos Michalakakis and people like him which provides a valuable contribution to the study of Kytherian migration.

The background to this story is well known. Kytherian immigration to Australia and America during the twentieth century had as its forerunner the migration waves to places such as Smyrna and Alexandria. The largest migration waves swept towards Australia as the island could not sustain its population.

Christos Michalakakis recalls the Kytherian migrants who were leaving for Australia and who would converge on Agia Pelagia with their relatives at a time when it was the principal port on the island. Christos recalls that they used to come from all over the island to his office to arrange their sea passage, initially to Piraeus and then invariably to Australia.

One incident, in particular, was vividly recalled. Christos remembers one young boy came to him, crying, and pleading with him that when his mother asked for a ticket, the agent was not to issue the ticket because the young lad wanted to stay in Kythera. Prospective immigrants were often faced with this last-minute dilemma: Kythera and poverty or foreign land and wealth.

Mr Michalakakis also recalls scenes of departure and pain. When the ship finally dropped anchor and the small boats started to load their passengers there were tearful scenes on the pier at Agia Pelagia with the soon-to-be migrants embracing their parents and relatives. As they boarded the ship they would wave their handkerchiefs at those left on shore who waved back. The agents and boat owners would console the relatives left behind not knowing if they would ever see their loved ones again. This was a scene that was played out numerous times.

As this eyewitness testimony bears out, the pier, the boats, the positioning of the ship, the migrants gathering on the deck to wave at their relatives and the symbolic waving of handkerchiefs represented basic elements in the departure of the immigrant. So much so that even the pier at Agia Pelagia represented a symbol of the recording of emotions and feelings of those left behind on the island. The immediate link was the professional agent and the boat operators as the scenes of departure and heartache were played out before them like a movie.

Some Kytherians left on their own; or with the whole family or with two or three members only. The immigrants were of all ages (young and old) and both men and women. The period between 1945 and 1960 was a period of major overseas migration with the most popular destination being Australia followed by America.

Calypso recited a famous poem by the Kytherian folkloric poet, Panos Fyllis (which, although reproduced in English, still manages to convey the hurt and anguish of the Kytherian mother seeing her child depart):

When you return from overseas, my son My beloved son I will now longer be living My beloved son you will find me, Down in the ground When you return from overseas, My beloved son

The feelings on separation were different for those who left from Kythera looking for a better life, because in reality they were travelling to the unknown. And different emotions for those who remained behind, particularly the parents who sent their children to foreign lands and who felt a greater pain.

The personal recollections of agents such as Christos Michalakakis underscore the emotions of departure and are an important aspect of the history and study of Kytherian migration.

# PANAYOTIS FATSEAS: KYTHERIAN FACES, 1920 – 1938


anayotis Fatseas (1888-1938) was the first professional Kytherian photographer, through whose studio in Livadi passed many Kytherians seeking to have their portrait taken; some on their way to Australia or the USA, others to send a precious image of parents, wife or children to the emigrant many thousands of miles away.

When he died, Fatseas left behind an archive consisting of several thousand glass negatives. Forgotten for decades, the archive was rescued at the very last moment by the Kythera/Cultural Association and restored thanks to the generous sponsorship of Angelo and John Notanas of Sydney.

In February 2008, a major exhibition of Fatseas' work was presented at the prestigious Benaki Museum in Athens under the title "Faces of Kythera. 1920-1938", attracting many thousands of viewers and enthusiastic critical response. The exhibition was accompanied by the publication of a high-quality monograph in Greek, which included 122 full-page duotone illustrations and an extensive essay by the exhibition curator, photographer and photographic historian John Stathatos. Following the success of the Greek edition, "Panayotis Fatseas: Faces of Kythera, 1920-1938" is now being published in an English edition.

"The exhibition is not merely an interesting addition to the history of photography, but a revekation. The self-taught Kytherian who founded the island's first photographic studio could be included among the five best Greek photographers of the first half of the 20th century": — Margarita Pournara, Kathimerini newspaper.

"The Kytherians photographed by Fatseas do not seem like impersonal figures, symbolic perhaps of some nostalgically viewed past, but preserve



their individual personalities. The two or three days' wages which they paid the photographer turn out to have been a good investment, since alongside the postcard-sized prints mailed to a father or son in Australia, they were – all unwittingly – also purchasing a small fraction of immortality. Not just because their faces have travelled down the years to reach us, but above all because the photographer's alchemy proves such that before these miraculously resurrected photographs, we pause involuntarily to study their image and wonder who they were, how they lived and what passed before their eyes." – John Stathatos
